This is the core purpose of most technical manuals. The lab report which is a detailed account of an experiment, its methods, results, and conclusions which answer a question. People use different types of styles in those steps to complete the report. They must include all of the above steps in order to fulfill the lab report's requirements. The final assignment which is a group project requires a proposal and a presentation. This project requires all group members work and opinions. Their linguistic differences are a great resource to gather information and to develop rhetorical sensibility.

The resume and cover letter almost go hand in hand in terms of purpose. Of all the assignments we have done in class, I personally believe these two were the most important. Regardless of what career choice I make in the future, it will most likely include an interview process. Writing the resume provided an opportunity for me to enhance my editing, drafting and self-assessment skills. The resume writing involved several drafts where I had to condense all my prior activities and experiences into a format that is quick and appealing to employers. A resume is a succinct outline of my education, experience, activities, accomplishments, and skills as they pertain to my employment goals. Employers may spend only 30 seconds scanning a resume to determine whether my background matches their requirements. my potential customer or the employer. Also, as I begin to develop my career and life vision, cover letters give me an opportunity to introduce myself and direct my reader's attention to unique and specific areas of my background that align with the types of roles I would like to explore. From a structural writing, as a writer, my goal is to present a clear understandable work. For structure writing, I often use titles to the main sections as headings or subheadings.
